### **Midfield Business Community Growth**





The City of Midfield has issued numerous citations for abandoned cars and unsightly properties.

The City of Midfield is working with the Jefferson County Sheriff's office by installing live cameras to aid law enforcement.

The City of Midfield passed an ordinance that allows residents to petition for speed bump installation by getting two-thirds of residents on a street to sign a petition. Petitions can be picked up at Midfield City Hall.

The City of Midfield paved a one-mile stretch of 8th Street at a cost of \$975,000.

But we're just getting started. The goal isn't to return to a pre-pandemic Midfield, where families struggled to get ahead in communities that were left behind. Instead, we're working toward realizing a vision for the City of Midfield where people are connected to resources and opportunities that help them build a better life, and every community has what it needs to thrive.

It's a new year and a new day in the City of Midfield. It will take all of us working together to make our shared vision a reality.

While we face many challenges in the City of Midfield, we also have an opportunity to work together to make Midfield a vibrant, safe, and healthy place everyone can call home. ### **Police Department**

Below are listed projects that are just completed or currently ongoing with the Midfield Police Department:

- 1. Adding additional police officers
- 2. Adding 10 new Police Vehicles
- 3. Installation of New 911 system
- 4. Beginning the installation of a Computer Aided Dispatch system
- 5. Addition of 6 Flock License plate reader cameras around the city
- 6. Addition of 6 additional red light cameras in the city
- 7. Addition of 4 stationary speed cameras in the city
- 8. Additional training for officers on De-Escalation and Implicit Bias

#### Fire & Rescue

The Midfield Fire and Rescue Service is a strong progressive department consisting of men and women who are committed to providing Fire and Advanced Life Support services to the citizens of Midfield.

The Department employs Paramedics, Emergency Medical Technicians, and Firefighters.

These highly trained first responders operate one fully equipped light rescue unit and two fully equipped pumper trucks to handle fire and emergency responses.

The station is staffed 24 hours/7 days a week to serve the citizens of Midfield. In 2022 the Department responded to 1,163 Emergency Responses.

# Public Works Street & Sanitation – Parks & Recreation

In 2022, the City of Midfield issued 342 citations to property owners for unkept properties and/or high weeds. Public Works picked up 850 tons of trash and 3000 bags of paper.

The Midfield Community Center is open part-time with full-time operation by the end of February.

Public Works improved Street Lighting with LED lighting and is currently remodeling the Highland Senior Center and adding a commercial kitchen.

The City of Midfield is now asking all residents to bag leaves for pickup and if you are discarding large household items; you can bring them to the Street Department at 600 MLK Drive. Help Keep Our City Clean!
